Lowell Long was born in Shelby, MT and raised in Conrad. He graduated from Conrad High School in May of 1975 and joined the United States Marine Corps, June 4, 1975. He comes from a family of those who have chosen to serve this great nation. He served four years on active Lowell E Long, Jr. duty serving at

CA, and Okinawa, Japan. His MOS was Mortarman, he also served as a chaplains assistant. Lowell was released from active duty in the Marine Corps in June of 1979. He joined the Montana Army National Guard in 1982 where he served in several units that were based at different times in Havre, in various supply roles.

While he was with the 443rd Quartermaster Co. he was activated to go to Iraq in 2004 with the 639th Quartermaster Co. He worked in various fields of Supply warehousing. Lowell retired from the Army National Guard in 2007, after serving nearly 28 years in the military.



ongratulations to the participants of the 2022 Montana Department of The American Legion for a successful Convention, the 103rd annual Convention. Congratulations to the 2021-2022 American Legion leadership headed by Glen Sharbono, Post 138, Ronan for a successful year. A History Point: The 4th Annual Convention was conducted at the Liberty Theater in Kalispell, Montana July 20-22, 1922. C. Thomas Busha of Helena served as the Department Commander.

As the department historian, I hope everyone was able to visit the museum at Fort Harrison, and hopefully caught the traveling exhibits, 1944 Veterans Adjustment Act, known as the GI Bill, and "The Colors of Our Country" which were on display since the last week of May and remained through the 246th Independence day celebration on July 4, 2022, at the Montana Military Museum located at Ft. Harrison.

The exhibits were in place to honor the 75th Anniversary of Montana's American Legion Boys State being conducted at Fort Harrison, American Legion Auxiliary Girls at Carroll College, and Montana Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol. The Exhibit along with its companion exhibit is open to the public.

The GI Bill exhibit was built in New Orléans in 2017 as an initiative to celebrate The American Legion 100th Anniversary and to educate audiences about one of our greatest achievements during that century. The first venue for display was at the National WWII Museum in New Orleans in June 2017. Making it a traveling exhibit has allowed many to see it who would not have had the opportunity. The large exhibit is permanently installed at the Indiana War Memorial Museum near The American

Legion National Headquarters.

The companion exhibit entitled, "The Colors of Our Country," has been on display but also traveled to Missoula, MT for 2022 Department of Montana



American Legion Convention on 16-19 June 2022. It is a 20 ft. exhibit that vividly illustrates the 250-year evolution of the Stars and Stripes from a battle flag for patriots to the enduring symbol of American freedom.

Yearly, Posts are challenged to submit a Post yearbook for competition; the Historian's Office received two One-Year Post Yearbooks for the announced 2021-22 Department Contest. They were: American Legion of Montana Ravalli Post 47 of Hamilton, and Montana and American Legion of Montana Post 58 in Plentywood, MT.

The reviewing committee recognized Post 47 as the first-place winner in 2021-22 Department Contest and Post 58 as the runner up. Post 47 will now be allowed to move forward to the National Contest if it's in the dictated format. Complete contest rules can be found in The American Legion Officer Guide, pages 139-149. Both Post histories were recognized at the Department level. I encourage more Posts to submit in coming years.

Also, monetary and certificate awards were given to The American Legion Oratory Contest winner (Dillon Macilwraith of Darby High School) and two American Legion Essay Contest winners (Peter Harrington 10th Grade, and Laurel DeGroot 7th Grade), both are home schooled. Special recognition was rendered for the Law Enforcement Officer of the Year (Randy Eppinger of the Hamilton Police Depart-

ment) and

On 10 June, massive rainstorms (4" rain in 24 hrs.) and resulting melting snowpack caused significant flooding in Red Lodge on 12 June, forcing evacuations. Rock Creek crested at noon on 13 June; however, while waters receded in Red Lodge, road and bridge damage was significant. The Yellowstone and Gardiner Rivers also had dangerous and destructive flooding on 13 June affecting Cooke City, Gardiner and Silver Gate. Evacuation orders on 14 June expanded to include portions of Belfry, Fromberg and Joliet with boil orders in effect due to compromised water supplies. Evacuation shelters were set up by The American Red Cross. The Montana National Guard conducted rescue operations

On 14 June, the Governor's office declared a disaster in Carbon, Park and Stillwater Counties, with the White House approving it on 16 June, paving the way for Federal recovery assistance.

On 14 June, more than 10,000 visitors were ordered to evacuate Yellowstone National Park as historic flooding tore through the northern half of the park, washing out bridges, roads and sweeping employee rental housing downstream - including the furnishings and personal possessions one Legion Post 118 member and his family owned (except the little they had taken with them out of state where they were visiting family at the time.)

What if it were you who was out of state when you watched all your family owned get pulled into the Yellowstone River and float away? What would you need to begin again? The recovery process after experiencing a major disaster of any kind is financially, mentally and physically exhausting.

The Stillwater River and East Rosebud Creek also flooded. Stillwater Post 34 was built with the expectation of the need to withstand some minor flooding; however, it wasn't "minor" flooding and the hands-on cleanup effort needed is great. Flood waters leave a nasty mess when they recede. What would you need if it were your Post?

How will you help?

A resolution is a written, formal motion. Resolutions are used because

the motion may be presented in written form with some reasons included in the document. A resolution may be initiated by a member, a Unit, a District, or a Department committee. A resolution consists of two parts, the resolved clauses and whereas clauses. For information on writing a resolution, consult Roberts Rules of Order or any reliable source. A resolution must be written in proper form for it to be considered by the Department Resolutions Committee. A resolution initiated by a member, Unit, or District should have the approval of the Units, or District before being sent to the Department Resolutions Committee. The resolution must be submitted to the Department Resolutions Committee in time so that the Committee can approve the resolution, get approval from the proper committee (for instance finance if it involves money or constitution and bylaws if it involves them) and then the committee must send a copy out to the Department membership via the Department secretary at least 30 days before Department Convention. This is so that the convention delegates will be aware of the upcoming resolutions ahead of time and be able to consult with their Units on how they should vote. These procedures must be followed in order for the resolution to be read by the resolutions committee at Department Convention along with a recommendation to pass or not pass.

Thank you, Auxiliary Unit 135 for stepping up and making a soldier's day.



Brothers and Sisters in Arms, it has come to my attention that with this issue of the paper we are publishing Volume 100/Issue 1, that means The Montana Legionnaire has been publishing an impressive 100 years!

I went to digging in our archives and found some interesting things about The Legionnaire and its inception in Montana. I found in the blue book our predecessor, The Service Star, was published by Walter T. Neubert of Great Falls, and in 1921 it was adopted as the official publication of The American Legion of Montana. At the 1923 convention it was officially sanctioned by National Headquarters and cited as, "the best edited and most neatly printed Department publication of any Department of the organization."

By the 7th year of publication 1926, the paper was being published under the name The Montana Legionnaire, published regularly and mailed to each paid member in the state. In 1928, the 9th year, the paper was a decided financial success and the net profit for the year was \$2,286.19. Posts were encouraged to appoint a publicity person and send articles to the editor of The Legionnaire.

There have been lean years since the days that the paper could be called profitable, but it remains in print and into your mailbox on a quarterly basis still today. In 1922, Department convention an amendment to the constitution finally passed for the Department to take over the publication *The Service* Star. The resolution to raise dues to \$2.50 to cover a yearly subscription was defeated. However, in 1924 the executive committee through convention authorized an increase of 50¢ to cover the publication.

There is something about a paper—the feel of it and the particular smell it has. It is important to memorialize the activities and the times as they happen, we never know what someone down the line may think as they come across our articles and pictures. I mention this because in researching this small article I came across activities for our 44th year in existence; 1963 when a much younger Demorise Allen, then of Belfry, was elected District 11 Commander. We see him when we gather, and he is still giving his service to this nation, but I don't suppose there are too many of us around that knew this part of his Legion History. Demorise, Thank you for your time and your service!

Additionally, in 1920, The Bridger Times newspaper ran an article about a bunch of men who were to gather and form a local Post of service men. Father Wm. P. Callahan, the priest of Sacred Heart Church wrote a stirring letter to the editor about how politicians were just as comfortable in Washington as they had been in 1917-18. That it was right and just that the "boys" who were there should gather and impress upon those in control what it was like to "be there," to speak with authority from experience. Father Callahan served with the 603rd Engineers, First Army A.E.F. From this Post 59 was initiated, as paperwork would have it the charter never completed. They paid dues and held meetings but when it was brought to their attention too much time had passed and hence 59 became Post 71.

Every quarter many of you start to get hounded by myself to submit articles let me know what you are doing out there as Posts. Some respond with nothing or even better, "you're contacting the wrong person," a personal favorite.

I was asked to take the paper on last year. In fact, this time last year I was on the scramble to put together my first issue; to say the least I was overwhelmed and a bit lost. I found out though there is a great team of folks out there that work behind the scenes that help ensure that this paper looks great and most importantly records and shares what we are doing in our communities.

Becky Buckmaster is our layout designer and publisher, and each quarter for a couple of weeks she, Erin Carpenter, Office Manager for the Department of Montana, and I, must send over 100 emails back and forth between us. The dedication to the paper that Becky has and the patience she has with me as she has walks me through the process can only come directly from heaven.

Today we have the internet and cell phones, and everything is just at the end of your fingertips but 100 years ago, in 1922, the world relied on the radio and newspapers to spread information.

My point is newspapers are a recorded history, we garner knowledge and firsthand information. It is a tangible item you can hold in your hand and read. The fact that The American Legion of Montana as a fledgling organization took it upon themselves to publish and distribute a paper at a time when the nation was struggling and then kept it going shows the spirit of the American serviceman and servicewoman.

Today we work with the Posts across the state to share information and see the faces of friends who may live clear across the state, but we only see a couple time a year at Department. I am incredibly proud to be a Legionnaire but also to have the privilege of putting this paper together. In researching this article today, I am reminded of those who had far fewer resources who came before us and built what we have today as Legionnaires.

Here's to another 100 years in print.





Montana Women Service in WWI

Bridie Mary Cantwell was born 18 January 1894 in County Kilkenny, Ireland, to James and Ellen Cantwell. Bridie immigrated to America in 1914. She became a nurse and settled in the roughand-tumble eastern Montana railroad cowtown of Miles City.

Cantwell nursed in the Miles City hospital. When World War One came, on 16 May 1918 Cantwell entered the Army Nurse Corps from Miles City. For its smaller population, Miles City, Montana, per capita, probably sent more nurses (eight) to "The Great War" than any Montana town or city.

The Army assigned Cantwell to the base hospital at the massive Army training base at Camp Dodge, Iowa, north of Des Moines. About thirty World War One Montana nurses would, in time, serve at Camp Dodge. The camp saw tens of thousands of Army recruits. Disease and injuries soon overwhelmed the overworked and shorthanded nurses there. The deadly influenza epidemic also struck Camp Dodge in autumn, 1918.

Cantwell nursed at Camp Dodge throughout the war. The Army honorably discharged her, 2 November 1919. She returned to Miles City and continued her nursing career. In 1922, she married Orland Owen Coker in Omaha, Nebraska. He was a disabled World War One Army veteran. They had no children. In Omaha, she nursed at the Clarkson Memorial Hospital. Orland died in 1945. Bridie returned to Miles City where she died, 9 January 1965. She is buried in Holy Sepulcher Cemetery, Omaha, Nebraska. She has a veterans headstone showing her World War One service. May she rest in peace with the thanks of Montana and of a grateful nation.

Legion Programs-Montana established three

EXCERPTS TAKEN FROM MONTANA HISTORY BLUE BOOK It has been ascertained by reading the entire history of The American Legion of Montana that *three* National American Legion Programs have their start in Montana—by Montana Legionnaires and Auxiliary members.

In 1924, at the instigation of Mrs. J. Ward Crosby of Livingston and later Helena, a joint committee of The American Legion Auxiliary and the 40&8 of Montana set up a Child Welfare Committee and drafted a program. This later became the program of the National Child Welfare Committee in 1926.

The American Legion's "Get out the Vote" program was originated by the Butte Post in 1921 and was adopted by National in 1927. This program is emphasized every national election year.

The Sons of the American Legion was also originated by the Butte Post in 1930. The Butte S.A.L. Squadron was so successful, and others started in Montana, that it became a National Program in 1927.

The Butte Post also started citizenship courses for aliens in the 1920's. They later issued a booklet of a study course for these aliens and the booklet became standard use throughout the United States for those seeking U.S. citizenship. Using this as a guide, The National American Legion is now issuing a booklet to serve the same purpose.

It was also revealed that The American Legion of Montana was given a quota of \$20,000 of American Legion's new Endowment Fund in 1925. When the state drive was over Montana had \$33,000 for the fund. This money was from people of all walks of life and many of them were not Legionnaires.

Our new Department Commander has challenged us to work the National Programs; this is just an example of what Montana Veterans can do when they put their minds to it.

American Legion Boys State, in its 75th year as a national program, was executed on May 29th for June 3rd, 2022, at Fort Harrison, MT. Eleven months prior, the Department Commander solicited my support to serve as the director of American Legion Boys State. With hesitation and extensive conversations with my family, I took on this cause. From the onset, there were hurdles that our Department, American Legion Boys State Committee, and me had to overcome to ensure the proper execution of one of The American Legion's most profound activities supporting Americanism at the highest level.

From the onset, this year's session can easily be considered a Phoenix year. With the relocation of the session from Carroll College to its third location in the program's history of Fort Harrison, MT, many things had to be reestablished or designed to ensure the continuity of this program. At the Department's fall conference, our committee met and immediately identified the challenges ahead of us. The program's potential for success was built around the five men I had the honor to serve with: Ken Simon, Jeb Damson, Scott Miller, Terry Wahl, and our Adjutant Duane Cunningham. All saw the opportunity ahead of us to influence the 2022 session. During the committee meeting, we identified the challenges ahead of us, including promoting the program internally, marketing it in the schools, and establishing a curriculum that supports civics and Americanism. I saw the need to ensure it is nested with The American Legion's pillar of Americanism.

The Department commander and adjutant requested from the Montana National Guard the opportunity to host the session on Fort Harrison. This option to relocate to Fort Harrison created many opportunities for success. The facilities, accommodations, and cost were a needed boost to the program. Fort Harrison also offered us



the flexibility to recruit well into May, whereas Carroll College would have had to be locked in the first week

One key to success of the program that carried forward from previous is the support of the Adjutant Assistant, Erin Carpenter. Without her the program cannot happen. We need the full-time support and attention that Erin was able to provide.

Your 2022 Session had 61 registered delegates from 38 different communities. Our themes for these boys included Statesmanship, Politics not Partisanship, the US Flag and Service members Readjustment Act of 1944. To help execute this session, with little historical knowledge, I needed an adaptive team. Your lead counselors for this year included Scott Miller, Joe Yeomen, Paul Munson, and John Silkman. With four National Guard NCOs, SFC Jim Leeper, SSG Michael Hunter, SSG Jordon Laine and SSG Pat Criswell and anchored by Jed Damson and Ken Simon. These outstanding men brought leadership, adaptability, and desire to grow young men. As you can imagine it was a fastpaced week with long days. I would like to recognize Joe Yeomen for his Memorial Day Speech. It had been many years since I was that emotional on Memorial Day and many of the boys carried some of the same emotions. With eight guest speakers including the Governor, Secretary of State, and the Attorney General all sharing knowledge of our government, their duties and leadership. 



How to Submit Articles & Photos?

Deadline: OCT 1, 2022 — PAY ATTENTION TO DEADLINE!

(always include Post & City in Email Subject Line)

<u>Text</u> – No formatting such as, multiple space & multiple tabs to line up text

- Set <u>one</u> tab (publisher will format to line up paragraphs and columns) PLEASE do not use multiple spaces as *All formatting has to be removed before placing into paper.*
- Modern formatting is single-space between sentences (after the period)
- Provide Post City as well as Post/Unit number
- · Post, Unit & Department are capitalized
- Best practice is articles/stories written in third-person unless you're talking about quotes
 from actual people, of course. There really should never be any "we did this" or "I/we think
 that" written in the body of a good news story imagine someone else is telling your story
 at all times, as though the journalist is telling the reader about someone or something else.
- Acronyms. Always keep new members informed and familiar with programs. For example: Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service (VAVS). The first time an acronym is used in an article use full title followed with acronym in parenthesis, then following first use, the acronym.
- Please keep articles to approximately 600 words per article.
- If you are using information in your article from another source be sure to use quotation marks and give credit to the author and/or publication you are taking the information from otherwise this is plagiarizing which has serious legal repercussions.
- **DO NOT** submit articles & photos in **PDF** format.
- If you want credit for an article or photo(s), you must let us know, otherwise it will not be noted.

Photos – send as e-mail attachments – PLEASE!!

- JPG format, as an attachment
- Default setting on a <u>digital camera</u> is usually set very high. Set to 1200 x 1725 pixels which is ideal for printing 4x6 with desired output resolution of 300 dpi.
- Older Cell Phone photos are many times too poor quality so take your time taking the photo & get them focused.

If the photo is blurry, too far away, tops of heads cut off, shows just the backs of heads we cannot make it look better for you. Send photos in medium resolution.

Captions should be noted in the e-mail:

Photo# caption which includes Post/ Unit #, Name, City along with the names of those in the photo and what Post/Unit they are members of.

- Don't spend time setting up photos and captions in a Word document PLEASE
 Each time a photo is copied/pasted to edit it loses integrity. Send as an e-mail attachment.
- Do Not embed (insert) photos in an e-mail (use attach)

See above (if embedded in the body of an e-mail the photo has to be copied/pasted into Word, then copied/pasted into photo editor). **Send as an e-mail attachment**.

News articles

Sending a <u>hyperlink</u> to an article via e-mail is best (rather than hard-copy to scan)

Helps ensure article can be found (sometimes older articles are archived and cannot be found) and also to give proper credit to the author and newspaper to avoid plagiarizing.

Corrections to previously-sent articles

Send an e-mail with the corrections only

Most times the article has already been formatted and grammar-edited, and inserting the correction saves a lot of time in redoing. **Edit and spellcheck your work <u>before</u> you send** it the first time.

Byline... remember... always include the submitters name for articles.

The biggest day was the event at the Capital. These young boys were amazing, and Scott Miller was phenomenal in guiding and mentoring in all aspects civics in action. Thank you, Bill Rich, John Joyce and Bill White, for supporting the Capital day in your Legion cap.

2022 Session Governor was Charles Fox from Helena. Your Boys Nation delegates are Grady Radke from Drummond and Roman Jacobsen from Great Falls. Charles Fox and Thomas Konopka from Kalispell were selected as alternates.

So, what does the way forward look like? As a team and an organization, recognition is one of the most significant challenges for this program. The first was to understand which organization runs the program, "THE AMERICAN LEGION BOYS STATE." Many people may have heard of Boys State, but most did not affiliate with our organization, which is a significant misstep. The Commander authorized a \$2 fine to remind us how important it is to promote our organization and the Legion as the driving factor. Finally, I go back to where I started this report, we have been doing American Legion Boys State 75 years. It is our duty to promote Americanism and mentoring young people. 

988 suicide crisis hotline launches July 16

The Suicide Prevention Lifeline's new three-digit dialing code will go live nationwide on July 16. People experiencing a mental health crisis will be able to call 988 and connect to counselors with the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network. Advocates believe

that designating a three-digit telephone number will transform access to mental health care. The three-digit number is easy to remember, which should make it faster for Americans dealing with a mental health crisis to receive life-saving support.

The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network consists of more than 200 crisis centers nationwide. Veterans experiencing distress or a mental health crisis will now be able connect to the Veterans Crisis Line by dialing 988 then pressing 1. This will provide veterans with fast and easy access to veteran-specific mental health support.

According to the Department of Veterans Affairs 2021 National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report, nearly 46,000 Americans — including over 6,000 veterans — died by suicide in 2019. The American Legion supported the legislation designating 988 as the universal telephone number of the national suicide prevention and mental health crisis hotline system through Resolution No. 377: Support for Veteran Quality of Life.
