Most recently, your American Legion stepped forward when the devastating December fires severely impacted Denton MT, the Gibson Flats area near Great Falls MT, and the Browning MT area and activated the Montana Department of The American Legion to action in support of veterans and their families as well as the communities.

The American Legion of Montana challenged all 122 of its Posts and Veterans at-large to participate in the rebuilding of the community infrastructure in the affected areas as seven Veterans from those areas suffered some form of loss. Posts, Auxiliary Units, Sons of The American Legion squadrons, and individual Legionnaires donated monies, services, and moral support to this effort, personifying the word "Legionnaire."

In October I attended Fall Conference in Indianapolis where there was much discussion on the Membership Software Program Personify; the program has gotten better, specifically, at the Post level, the Department level remains a work in progress. COVID-19 has created many obstacles with respect to in-person meetings, trainings, and conferences, the National Convention being held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin will be one of the first attempts at normalcy. The dates are August 26 - September 1, 2022; we have a skeleton of the tentative schedule:

Friday, August 26, 2022 - Color Guard Competition at 4:00 PM.

SUPPORT POSTS - NOT A NEW REGULATION

Fatality Marker Program

We are receiving several comments which indicate Posts are having a difficult time meeting the regulation for bendable support posts. Let me be clear, this is NOT A NEW REGULATION!

This specification was recommended by the Director of Montana Department of Transportation (MDT), David A. Galt, as far back as November 5, 2001.

One of my primary duties as Chairman of the Fatality Marker Program was to review existing rule, regulations, and guidelines for the program. Correspondence between MDT and the American Legion have clearly stated our support posts needed to conform to the bendable, or as I call it, the "delineator" standard.

In 2018, we were able to insert a "grandfather" clause into the Guide to Standardized Marker Hardware which protected existing non-conforming support posts. However, it was stated "new Fatality Markers, and those removed and replaced for any reason, must conform to the newer standards effective July 16, 2019". You see, even I have referred to them as a "new" standard.

When our Guide to Standardized Marker Hardware was sent to MDT this year, the "grandfather" clause was stricken. Hence, those of us in the Fatality Marker Program have had 20 some years to come into compliance.

came as a suggestion, "We have been successful in contacting highway construction companies and having them donate "used" delineator posts which cannot be reused on other road projects." We know of a few Posts which acted on the suggestion; another Post chose to buy new delineator support posts. Legion Posts who secured more support posts than they needed, began sharing with neighboring Posts. We then put together a list of regional con-

struction companies who may be willing to provide their "surplus" delineator posts, FREE of charge. Contacts were listed for Billings, Butte, Bozeman, Great Falls, and Helena. (Missoula has a contractor who has provided us with surplus posts for several years). This list was provided to each District Coordinator with the intent they contact the contractor closest to them and secure the posts they need on an annual basis. Each District Coordinator will serve


as a single point of contact with contractors, to avoid overwhelming businesses, and distribute items to Legion Posts within their own District. This isn't a treasure hunt, should not cost anything, and should not cause you any anxiety. Stay Safe Out There!

Naplain's Corner Chaya "Hiya" Semple, Dept. Chaplain The Story of the Four Chaplains

(INFORMATION GLEANED FROM THE FOUR CHAPLAINS MEMORIAL



On the evening of February 2, 1943, the U.S.A.T. Dorchester was carrying 902 service men, merchant seamen and civilian workers from Newfoundland toward an American base in Greenland. Once a luxury coastal liner, the ship had been converted into an Army transport ship. The Dorchester, one of three ships in the SG-19 convoy, was moving steadily across the icy waters, escorted by Coast Guard Cutters (CGC) Tampa, Escanaba and Comanche.

Earlier in the day, the CGC Tampa had detected a submarine with its sonar. German U-boats were constantly prowling the sea lanes, and several ships had already been sunk. The Dorchester was only 150 miles from its destination; however, the captain ordered all men on

board to sleep in their clothing and to keep life jackets on. Many soldiers sleeping deep in the ship's hold disregarded the order because of the engine's heat, while others ignored it because the life jackets were uncomfortable.

On Feb. 3, at 12:55 a.m., a German U-223 submarine approached the convoy on the surface, and fired a fan of three torpedoes. The Dorchester was struck by one on the starboard side amid ship, far below the water line. When the ship's Captain was alerted that the ship was taking water rapidly and sinking, he gave the order to abandon ship. In less than 20 minutes, the Dorchester slipped beneath the Atlantic's icy waters.

Tragically, the torpedo hit also knocked out power in addition to radio contact with the three escort ships. Fortunately, CGC Comanche saw the flash of the explosion. It responded and rescued 97 survivors. The CGC Escanaba also circled the Dorchester, rescuing an additional 132 survivors. The third cutter, CGC Tampa, continued on, escorting the remaining two ships.

The blast immediately killed scores of men and seriously wounded many more. Others, stunned by the explosion were left groping in the darkness. According to eyewitnesses, men jumped from the ship into lifeboats, over-crowding them to the point of capsizing. Rafts tossed into the Atlantic drifted away before soldiers could

Also, according to eyewitnesses, four Army chaplains were lights in the darkness - who brought hope amid chaos and despair. Those chaplains were: Lt. George L. Fox, Methodist; Lt. Alexander D. Goode, Jewish; Lt. John P. Washington, Roman Catholic; and Lt. Clark V. Poling, Dutch Reformed. Quickly and quietly, the four chaplains spread out among the soldiers where they worked to calm the frightened, guide the disoriented toward safety and tend the wounded.

"Witnesses of that terrible night remember hearing the four men offer prayers for the dying and encouragement for those who would live," said Wyatt R. Fox, son of Reverend Fox. One witness, Private William B. Bednar, found himself floating in oil-smeared water surrounded by dead bodies and debris. "I could hear men crying, pleading, praying," Bednar recalls. "I could also hear the chaplains preaching courage. Their voices were the only thing that kept me going." Another sailor, Petty Officer John J. Mahoney, tried to re-enter his cabin but Rabbi Goode stopped him. Mahoney, concerned about the cold Arctic air, explained he had forgotten his gloves. "Never mind," Goode responded. "I have two pair." The rabbi then gave the petty officer his own gloves. In retrospect, Mahoney realized Rabbi Goode wasn't conveniently carrying two pair of gloves, and that the rabbi had already decided not to leave the Dorchester.

By this time, most of the men were topside, where the chaplains opened a storage locker and began distributing life jackets. It was then that Engineer Grady Clark witnessed an astonishing sight. When there were no more life jackets in the storage room, the chaplains removed theirs and gave them to four frightened young men. "It was the finest thing I have seen or hope to see this side of heaven," said John Ladd, another survivor who saw the chaplains' selfless act. When giving away their life jackets, Rabbi Goode didn't call out for a Jew; Father Washington didn't call out for a Catholic; nor did Reverends Fox and Poling call out for a Protestant. They simply gave their life jackets to the next man in line. As the ship sank, survivors in

nearby rafts saw the four chaplains with arms linked and braced against the slanting deck. Their voices could also be heard offering prayers.

Of the 902 men aboard the U.S.A.T. Dorchester, 672 died, leaving only 230 survivors. When the news reached American shores, the nation was stunned by the magnitude of the tragedy and the heroic conduct of the four chaplains. That night Reverend Fox, Rabbi Goode, Reverend Poling and Father Washington became an enduring example of extraordinary courage, faith and selflessness.

On December 19, 1944, the Distinguished Service Cross and Purple Heart were awarded posthumously to the Four Chaplains' next of kin.

A one-time-only posthumous Special Medal for Heroism was authorized by Congress and awarded to next of kin by President Eisenhower on January 18, 1961. Congress attempted to confer the Medal of Honor but was blocked by the stringent requirements that required heroism performed under fire. The special medal was intended to have the same weight and importance as the Medal of Honor.

In 1988, February 3 was established by a unanimous act of Congress as an annual "Four Chaplains Day." February 3, 2018 marks the 75th Anniversary of the sinking of the Dorchester.

From the Four Chaplains website: "We may never be asked to give up our own life jacket to save another person, but the story of the Four Chaplains can inspire us to reach out a helping hand in a time of need."

American Legion Posts throughout the nation hold memorial services the first weekend of February or on February 3rd to remember the Four Chaplains. To date I am aware of the Department Four Chaplains Ceremony which will be held Thursday, February 3rd, 1300 hrs. at the Montana Military Museum at Fort Harrison and another hosted by Post 123 in Laurel. You, as the veteran, are your best historian. Along with the medical records you collect showing a diagnosis and / or treatment of a condition that may be related to service, including secondarily related conditions, you will be asked to provide a personal statement detailing what you did when you were in service, how the injury occurred, where you sought treatment then and today, and if the condition continues to the present day. You should keep a log of the condition, if it worsens, is it incapacitating, does it happen more than once a month, do you need assistance, how do you treat it, how long does it last, do you need assistance, and where it is on a pain scale from 1 - 10. This logbook can help the compensation and pension examiner understand more clearly your situation and it can assist the Rating Veteran

Service Representative in determining the percentage of service connection, or special monthly compensation to be awarded (if the condition is primarily or secondarily service connected). For example:

You were seen for a lower back injury in the service and were treated by pain medication, physical therapy, surgery, or a combination thereof, this shows an in-service incident/injury. You filed a claim and are service connected at 20 percent for a Lumbosacral spine condition. Now you have been out of the service for 10 years your condition has progressed, you start a logbook showing that you experience, several times a month, shooting pains down into your legs that leave your feet tingling and numb. Several days a month you are unable get out of bed due to flares and the persistent pain at a steady 7 on the pain scale. You have seen a chiropractor that states you are experiencing sciatica down both legs, due to your lower back; you see your primary care physician who refers you to a neurologist that confirms you are experiencing radiculopathy due to your lower back condition. You collect your Non-Government Medical records, the neurologist's records, your Lumbosacral logbook, and visit your local VSO to file an increase in the primary Lumbosacral spine condition, and secondary radiculopathy in the left and right lower extremities.

Your spouse, coworkers, or supervisor can provide a lay statement to support your claim. This statement may provide supporting evidence to corroborate your claim and what your current situation looks like.

During the week of Legion College, you are divided into Districts, in order to prepare and move a resolution through the process. It really opens your eyes to not only how a resolution is written, but also, to how you must look at the big picture and make sure that you are dotting all the 'i's' and crossing all the 't's.' I can say I walked away with a better understanding of what's required.

The second and probably most important piece I took from Legion College was that simple 2-minute speech, and how it relates to membership, and being ready when someone asks why they should join the Legion. How it can result in a new member or someone who walks away, and it can be challenging for sure to constantly be ready to tell your story.

The reality is, think back to the reason you joined The American Legion; what is your why?

The 'why' is a need for the military comradery, a need to belong, the desire to give back to the community. Military members are notoriously selfless and want to give back because of how they feel about their community and country. Sometimes when you self-reflect on your why, it can be a much more personal or sensitive reason. Myself, I fall into the comradery and giving back reasons for joining. Quite frankly, making friends that do not have a military background, rucked in the same boots as you have, can be difficult. Making comradery a big factor to 'my why.' The ability to rib and joke with my brothers and sisters form other branches of service often keeps me grounded and happy.

So, I challenge each of you to ask yourself that simple question: "What is my Why?" Because if you can answer that question, your recruiting and retention speech for membership is already written for you. To wrap this up please crack a good joke on your Marine, Sailor, Soldier, or Airmen brethren; it's one of our 'Whys.'

A woman member of The American Legion who has, in the judgment of the Echelon, rendered outstanding service through active lead-

ership as a Post officer, a committee chairman or other service in the programs of The American Legion is eligible for an invitation to join. She must be in good standing for a continuous period of at least twelve months immediately prior to the date of her application with current Legion dues.

What We Do

Our charter gave us the mission to aid women veterans wherever they may be and in whatever way they need. Since our members are all Legionnaires, we also work to support the activities and programs of the Legion. These good works are ongoing and conducted by our



members nationwide through service to God and Country.

The National Society offers a \$1,000 scholarship each year to a child, grandchild, or greatgrandchild of a Twenty & Four member or to a current member who wishes to return to the workplace and needs further education to do so. The application is need-based.



zation of male and female U.S. veterans, commonly known as the Forty & Eight.

The Forty & Eight is committed to charitable and patriotic aims. The titles and symbols of the Forty & Eight

reflect its First World War origins. Americans were transported to the battle front on French trains within boxcars stenciled with a "40/8", denoting its capacity to hold either forty men or eight horses. This uncomfortable mode of transportation was familiar to all who fought in the trenches; a common small misery among American soldiers who thereafter found "40/8" a lighthearted symbol of the deeper service, sacrifice and unspoken horrors of war that bind all who have borne the battle.

The Forty & Eight was founded in 1920 by American veterans returning from France. Originally an arm of The American Legion, the Forty & Eight became an independent and separately incorporated veteran s organization in 1960. Membership is by invitation of honorably discharged veterans and honorably serving members of the United States Armed Forces.

MONTANA JOINED THE 40 & 8 IN 1922: The Call for the organization of the Grande Voiture Du Montana was sent out by B. J. Conrad, Correspondant of Voiture Local 119 of Winnett, Montana in Spring 1922 to all Locale Voitures in Montana. Locale Voitures were present in Winnett, Lewistown, Billings, Glendive, Miles City, Helena, Butte,

They are: Voiture Anaconda/Butte 262 (south Central Montana; Voiture Missoula 467 Western Montana; Voiture 579 Billings Eastern Montana; Voiture 718 Helena Central Montana; and Voiture 922 Havre Montana Highline. Grande Du Montana has a total of nearly 100 members. The highest numbers of members in the Grande were close to 400 in the year 1960. The Grande has lost membership

Grande Du Montana participates in at least six recognized programs of the Nationale:

When we get to next summer and have a grand opening, we are going to have way too many people to thank. The building herself will be a whole new thing ready to serve her community for another 100 years.



Americanism Corner

Each month the Department will highlight one of the outstanding youth programs that ties to The American Legion's Americanism pillar. This quarter we will spotlight Montana's American Legion Boys State. Future editions will include Government Survey and Essay contests, Oratory Contest, and American Legion Baseball.

American Legion Boys State is among the most respected educational programs of government instruction for high school students. A participatory program in which students become part of the operation of local, county, and state government. Operated by students elected to various offices, American Legion Boys State activities include legislative sessions, court proceedings, law-enforcement presentations, assemblies, bands, and recreational programs.

America Legion Boys State was founded in 1935 to counter the socialism-inspired Young Pioneer Camps. The program was the idea of two Illinois Legionnaires, Hayes Kennedy and Harold Card, who organized the first Boys State at the Illinois State Fairgrounds in Springfield. Illinois now hosts Premier Boys State, as with tradition in The American Legion, inaugural programs are titled "Premier."

Montana is one of the 49 American Legion Boys State programs, with Hawaii being the only one without. There are, however, 50 Boys State programs, with a national program held each July in the District of Columbia. Each year, Montana sends two participants to Boys Nation at no cost to them. Last year, based on the pandemic, Montana was able to send four delegates, as we were given the delegate slots from another department that did not conduct their program.

At American Legion Boys State, participants learn the rights, privileges and responsibilities of citizens. Informed citizenship will strengthen

American Legion Boys State our Country and our way of life. Our program has a heavy focus on education through our "learn by doing" approach. Throughout the week, citizens will participate in classroom

seminars, group discussions, interactive experiences, and other immersive learning methods as they participate in the program. This year most of the instruction will be held on Fort William Henry Harrison (just outside of Helena); with the standard visit, tour, and legislative session at the Capital.

The program will continue the high-quality instruction with outstanding keynote speakers from government, military, and private sectors. In addition to the location change from Carroll College to Fort Harrison, the date changed to start the Sunday before Memorial Day (29 May through 3 June 2022). We are hoping to see more participation and future recruiting with moving the program a week earlier. Since American Legion Boys State is starting on the Memorial Day Weekend, we will be paying homage to the World War II servicemembers who contributed to the enormous advancements our Country saw after the second Great War. This year's curriculum will be built around the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, commonly known as the G.I. Bill. We will be supported by The American Legion national media office with one or both G.I. Bill displays seen at past national conventions.

American Legion Boys State is a program every Post can participate in. The price will remain at \$300 for this year and will be reassessed after this year's program. Any District Commander that has 100 percent participation (participant or \$300 donation from each Post) with receive Department Convention Banquet dinner ticket. I want to thank all the volunteers for have made this program successful in the past. Our program is always in need of support, fiscal or labor. Please reach out to me if you desire to contribute in anyway this year. Post packets will be distributed in the month of January and registration will open 1 February through 30 April. Late registration will be taken through 25th of May with a \$50 late fee.

Please do not forget the Samsung Scholarship application. In 1996, worldwide electronics leader Samsung endowed a scholarship fund of \$5 million to be administered by The American Legion. Meant to show appreciation for U.S. veterans who came to Korea's aid during its struggle against communist forces in the Korean War, the Samsung American Legion Scholarship Program established a series of scholarships derived from interest and other income from the principal amount. To date, the Samsung American Legion Scholarship has awarded over \$5.5 million to more than 2000 applicants.

In closing, I am honored to serve as Chairman of American Legion Boys State committee and Director of the 2022 program. It is important we remember that it is American Legion Boys State. As you noticed in this article, we refer to the program as American Legion Boys State, not just Boys State. We are "fining" Legionnaires \$2 (for 2022) for not using American Legion Boys State when referring to the program and adding those fines to American Legion Boys State operation's fund. This a program has left its mark on thousands of Montanans and will continue to leave its mark on future generations.

The other four homes were damaged by smoke, flames and water and may or may not be a total loss. Most of Post 62's Veterans are on fixed incomes. Insurance claims can take a little time and Christmas is almost here I would like to challenge Montana's Legion Posts and Legionnaires to donate to the caus." A Denton Fire Relief Fund has been opened; checks can be made payable to the Denton Fire Relief Fund and mailed to Farmers State Bank, a division of Opportunity Bank of Montana, at P.O. Box 1047, Denton, MT 59430. Checks and donations may also be made to any of the 24 Opportunity Bank branches across Montana. All donations received will be managed locally and are fully tax deductible. 

Wreaths Across America



How to Submit Articles & Photos?

Deadline: APR 1, 2022

(always include Post & City in Email Subject Line) <u>Text</u> – No formatting such as, multiple space and multiple tabs to line up text

- Set one tab (publisher will format to line up paragraphs and columns) PLEASE do not use multiple spaces as All formatting has to be removed before placing into paper.
- Modern formatting is single-space between sentences (after the period)
- Provide Post City as well as Post/Unit number
- Post, Unit & Department are capitalized
- It is better if articles/stories are written in third person unless you're talking about quotes from actual people, of course. There really should never be any "we did this" or "I/we think that" written in the body of a good news story - imagine someone else is telling your story at all times, as though the journalist is telling the reader about someone or something else.
- **Acronyms**. Always keep new members informed and familiar with programs. For example: Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service (VAVS). The first time an acronym is used in an article use full title followed with acronym in parenthesis, then following first use, the acronym.
- Please keep articles to approximately 600 words per article.
- If you are using information in your article from another source be sure to use quotation marks and give credit to the author and/or publication you are taking the information from otherwise this is plagiarizing which has serious legal repercussions.
- **DO NOT** submit articles in **PDF** format.
- If you want credit for an article or photo(s), please make sure you let us know.

Photos – send as e-mail attachments – PLEASE!!

- JPG format, as an attachment
- Default setting on a digital camera is usually set very high. Set to 1200 x 1725 pixels which is ideal for printing 4x6 with desired output resolution of 300 dpi.
- Cell phone photos are many times too poor quality so take your time taking the photo & aet them focused.

If the photo is blurry, too far away, tops of heads cut off, shows just the backs of heads we cannot make it look better for you. Send photos in medium resolution.

Captions should be noted in the e-mail:

Photo# caption which includes Post/ Unit #, Name, City along with the names of those in the photo and what Post/Unit they are members of.

Don't spend time setting up photos and captions in a Word document - PLEASE

Each time a photo is copied/pasted to edit it loses integrity. Send as an e-mail attachment.

Do Not embed (insert) photos in an e-mail (use attach)

See above (if embedded in the body of an e-mail the photo has to be copied/pasted into Word, then copied/pasted into photo editor). Send as an e-mail attachment.

News articles

Sending a *hyperlink* to an article via e-mail is best (rather than hard-copy to scan) Helps ensure article can be found (sometimes older articles are archived and cannot be found) and also to give proper credit to the author and newspaper to avoid plagiarizing.

Corrections to previously-sent articles

Send an e-mail with the corrections only Most times the article has already been formatted and grammar-edited, and inserting the correction saves a lot of time in redoing. Edit and spellcheck your work before you send it the first time.

Byline... remember... always include the submitters name for articles.


